This study analyzes the connotative meanings in the lyrics of *Scars to Your Beautiful* by Alessia Cara, exploring how the song communicates messages of self-acceptance, empowerment, and resistance against societal beauty standards through connotative language. Using a semantic analysis approach, the study identifies three primary themes: self-worth and empowerment, the rejection of societal beauty ideals, and the symbolism of scars as a representation of personal growth and resilience. The analysis reveals how the song's lyrics encourage listeners to embrace their inherent beauty, reject narrow societal standards, and view scars as symbols of strength rather than imperfection. It plays a vital role in shaping the listener's perception of the song's message and themes.

One such song that invites an exploration of connotative meanings is *Scars to Your Beautiful* by Alessia Cara. Released in 2015, the song addresses issues related to body image, self-acceptance, and societal beauty standards. It challenges conventional perceptions of beauty and encourages listeners to embrace their uniqueness, regardless of societal pressures. The lyrics of the song employ powerful connotative language that resonates with audiences, especially in the context of body positivity and mental well-being (Rahmat et al., 2022). Several studies have explored the role of connotation in music, particularly in analyzing how song lyrics reflect societal values and individual emotions. For example, Jadou and Ghabra, (2021) examined the use of connotative language in pop songs, highlighting how lyrics reflect the cultural ideologies surrounding love, relationships, and self-image. Similarly, Rezvani et al. (2020) analyzed the symbolic meanings in songs related to body image, emphasizing how artists use connotation to challenge societal beauty standards. However, while previous studies have addressed the role of connotation in song lyrics, there is limited research specifically focusing on the connotative meanings in *Scars to Your Beautiful* by Alessia Cara, a song that explicitly tackles issues of self-acceptance and body image.

Although there has been substantial research on connotation in song lyrics, there is a gap in the literature when it comes to the specific semantic analysis of *Scars to Your Beautiful* in relation to body image and self-worth. This research aims to fill that gap by providing a detailed semantic analysis of the song's lyrics, focusing on the connotative meanings and their impact on the listener's understanding of beauty standards and self-acceptance. Connotative meanings often carry more weight in creative works such as literature and song lyrics, where words and phrases evoke personal interpretations and social implications (Ghaisani et al., n.d.).

Connotation, specifically, is a vital aspect of semantics as it influences how language can express more than just factual information. As noted by Lin et al. (2024), meaning is not fixed but is shaped by the context in which words are used. This flexibility allows artists, including songwriters, to manipulate connotations to convey messages that resonate deeply with listeners on an emotional or societal level. In music, connotation is often used to address complex themes such as identity, societal norms, and personal struggles.

In recent years, the study of song lyrics has gained significant attention in academic research, particularly in relation to how lyrics reflect social and cultural values. Songs, as a form of cultural expression, often use connotation to communicate messages that challenge societal norms and offer commentary on personal and collective experiences. For instance, Al-Amer et al. (2016) explored the connotative meanings in pop music lyrics, arguing that songwriters often use metaphor and symbolism to express complex emotions such as love, loss, and self-worth. Smith's study highlighted how artists manipulate connotation to convey messages that resonate with their audiences, especially in songs that address social issues (Rahmat & Dianita, 2024). Therefore, the study of connotative meaning in song lyrics is essential for understanding how music functions not only as entertainment but also as a powerful medium for conveying social messages and shaping listeners' perspectives.

Toleuzhan et al. (2023) further expanded on this by analyzing the role of connotation in songs about body image. His research emphasized that many contemporary songs, including *Scars to Your Beautiful*, use connotative language to challenge traditional beauty standards. The symbolic use of terms such as "imperfections" and "scars" in songs becomes a powerful tool for self-expression and empowerment, particularly for listeners who may feel marginalized by societal beauty ideals. Johnson's findings showed that these songs employ connotation not only to criticize societal beauty norms but also to promote body positivity and self-acceptance.

While several studies have focused on the role of connotation in song lyrics, there is limited research specifically examining *Scars to Your Beautiful* by Alessia Cara. The song has garnered attention for its message of self-acceptance and its challenge to conventional beauty standards, yet few studies have analyzed its lyrics through a semantic lens. According to Nasution et al. (2025), *Scars to Your Beautiful* stands out in the pop music genre for its direct engagement with body image issues, empowering listeners to embrace their flaws and reject society's narrow definitions of beauty. However, Davis's study focused more on the song's thematic elements rather than its connotative meanings.

One of the central themes in contemporary music, especially in pop and youth-oriented genres, is the issue of body image and self-acceptance. With the rise of social media and beauty standards that often prioritize unrealistic physical appearances, many artists have begun to challenge these norms in their music. *Scars to Your Beautiful* by Alessia Cara is one such song that addresses the damaging effects of societal beauty standards and promotes a message of self-love and empowerment.

Rabi'ah (2023) analyzed how *Scars to Your Beautiful* uses connotative language to depict the emotional struggles of individuals who feel pressured to conform to external beauty standards. The song's lyrics, including phrases such as "you are beautiful just the way you are" and "there's a hope that's waiting for you in the dark," convey an empowering message that encourages listeners to embrace their imperfections. The symbolic use of "scars" as a metaphor for personal growth and resilience resonates with listeners who may have faced societal criticism for not fitting traditional beauty norms.

In addition to *Scars to Your Beautiful*, other songs by artists such as Meghan Trainor and P!nk have similarly used connotation to promote body positivity and self-empowerment.

However, *Scars to Your Beautiful* stands out due to its direct engagement with the emotional aspects of body image issues, particularly the internal struggles faced by individuals who feel marginalized or excluded due to their appearance. The use of connotative language in the song helps create a relatable and deeply personal message for listeners who may experience similar challenges.

The connotative meanings in *Scars to Your Beautiful* extend beyond individual self-acceptance to challenge broader societal views on beauty. By using metaphorical language and symbolism, the song critiques the commercialization of beauty and the narrow ideals perpetuated by the media. As noted by Shoihah (2018), the song encourages listeners to redefine beauty on their own terms, empowering them to see themselves as worthy regardless of societal judgments.

In addition to fostering self-empowerment, the connotative meanings in *Scars to Your Beautiful* resonate with ongoing social movements such as body positivity and mental health advocacy. The metaphor of "scars" is used throughout the song to symbolize both physical and emotional challenges, as well as the resilience that comes from overcoming them. The line "But there's a hope that's waiting for you in the dark" suggests that the scars, whether literal or figurative, represent the difficulties one has faced and survived. In this context, scars carry a positive connotation, signifying strength and growth rather than imperfection or failure. This theme resonates with the broader cultural narrative surrounding mental health and the idea that our struggles and scars make us stronger and more authentic.

The connotative meanings found in *Scars to Your Beautiful* not only contribute to the song's empowering message but also reflect broader societal and cultural trends, particularly those related

to body image and self-acceptance. The song's lyrics, by using connotative language, provide a critique of traditional beauty standards, encouraging listeners to challenge societal expectations and embrace their authentic selves (Sholihah, 2018).

The theme of self-worth and empowerment is particularly significant in the context of contemporary discourse surrounding body positivity. This call for societal change resonates with global movements advocating for greater representation and inclusivity in the media, which has gained significant momentum in recent years.

In conclusion, the semantic analysis of *Scars to Your Beautiful* reveals that the song uses connotation to effectively communicate a powerful message of self-love, empowerment, and resistance against societal pressures. The connotative meanings in the lyrics not only contribute to the emotional impact of the song but also align with larger societal trends in body positivity, mental health, and the critique of traditional beauty standards.
